

Our Mission

To create a watershed investment fund in the Cache la Poudre and Big Thompson watersheds through which water beneficiaries fund fire mitigation projects in the upper watersheds to reduce impacts of wildfire on water resources. Our vision, mission and approach are focused on mitigating wildfire risks in order to improve forest health, enhance water quality and quantity and ensure businesses that rely heavily on clean and available water can prosper and thrive. While our focus is on water, there are numerous valuable co-benefits to this work including improved wildlife habitat, reduced infrastructure damage, decreased firefighting costs, avoided loss of recreational opportunities, etc.

Our Approach

Using sophisticated tools, Peaks to People Water Fund identifies the treatment type and location based on the greatest potential risk reduction. We monitor each site before and after the treatment to accurately measure the results of the treatments.

Peaks to People Water Fund and the Colorado Forest Restoration Institute have developed a **Watershed Investment Tool** to inform the type and location of forest health treatments in the watersheds, ensuring that funds are put towards the greatest potential outcomes. The tool also enables us to analyze the results of each project to inform future decisions. The Watershed Investment Tool can be used to identify priority treatment areas based on the needs and concerns of a specific entity that is at risk from increased sedimentation levels.

Additionally, Peaks to People Water Fund and Sitka Technology Group have developed a **Watershed Health Outcomes Tracker**. This valuable tool enables implementers, landowners and funders to track proposed and active projects designed to improve forest health and protect water in Northern Colorado. The tool allows implementers and funders to track performance measures for projects related to avoided water impacts as well as co-benefits. It is planned to be the primary means for proposing projects for funding from Peaks to People.

- Recruited Founding Stakeholder Group (see below)

2012

- Launched the Colorado Conservation Exchange to the public
- Established 3 pilot projects at Roberts and Sylvan Dale Ranches to prove the concept
- Co-initiated and co-founded the High Park Fire Coalition which then became CPRW
- Obtained first major donations from an anonymous donor and New Belgium Brewing to support initial feasibility studies
- Shifted focus to source water protection because of High Park Fire

2013

- Established more formal Exchange Steering Committee (see below)
- Completed first design workshop with Exchange Steering Committee and Visioning Document with Environment Incentives
- Completed Green-Gray Infrastructure Analysis to establish relative costs of investing in new water treatment plants compared with forest treatments

2014

- Established more formal Exchange Working Group with sub teams on Market Development, Science & Monitoring, Landowners, and Fund-raising and Outreach
- Submitted first major grant to fund staff and forest treatments

- Designed Exchange Operations Manual
- Established Exchange Charter, Vision and Road Map
- Secured major foundation funding to launch treatments, recruit staff
- Recruited Founding Director
- Launched New Forest Treatment Projects
- Focused on Development of the Watershed Investment Tool

- Completed Development of Watershed Investment Tool
- Formed Stakeholders Committee
